Wanda had been singing only a year when she acquired a sponsor for her own daily radio show over KLPR. One day Hank Thompson, well-known recording artist and band-leader was invited to the station for an interview. He met Wanda, listened to her singing and invited her to guest on his dance program. Hank then had Wanda rehearse with him and his band in his studio in Oklahoma City, made a dub of her voice, took the record to Paul Cohen who signed her immediately to Decca Records.

Wanda's very first release, "You Have My Love," backed with "Lovin' Country Style" was a great success.

Her other recordings include "If You Don't Somebody Else Will" (in which she and Billy Gray were teamed) "You'd Be The First One To Know," "Right To Love," "If You Knew What I Know," "Tears At The Grand Ole Opry" and "Be Nobody's Darling But Mine."

Wanda is now a regular on the "Ozark Jubilee" and her fan club president is Jody Schroeder, General Delivery, El Reno, Oklahoma. She recently finished school, and now will put her everything into her singing and song-writing. No doubt about it — this attractive young singer has a very promising future ahead of her.
